### **Childhood influenza immunisation programme**

I am writing to seek your help in raising awareness of the childhood influenza immunisation programme. Staff working in your sector can play a valuable role in talking to parents about the benefits of influenza vaccination.

In 2013, we started a phased roll-out programme to extend the offer of influenza vaccination to children. The vaccine is given as a nasal spray. This is quick and painless and no injection is involved. Not only does the influenza vaccine help to protect the children themselves, but by reducing the spread of influenza it will also help protect family members and others in the community. The influenza vaccine also promotes a healthy environment in nurseries and preschools by reducing the risk of spread of influenza to others including staff.

This coming winter, all children aged two and three can get the vaccine at their general practice. This is usually administered by the practice nurse. Previously children aged four, were offered the vaccine at their GP surgery, but this year these children will be offered the vaccine at school.

The programme continues to be rolled out, and children in reception class and years 1-4 in primary school will also offered the flu vaccine.
